The very first piece I composed was, "A Theme for the Special Olympics." Part of my student teaching internships included *Perkins School for the Blind* in Massachusetts where I had learned Braille Music notation for some of the kids in my care. In the 1980s, I devised a curriculum with simple tools for the handicapped called, "Music from Heart & Mind." When my 2nd Symphony premiered, I said, "if those in wheelchairs will listen, they'll stand up." This indeed happened in 2007 at the American Defenders of Bataan & Corregidor premiere of Kakehahsi: That We Might Live. Ex-POWs in their 90s stood from their wheelchairs. Symphony IIII: *Lightfall*, conducted by a wonderful Musician born with polio, was choreographed and performed by "Dancing Wheels," those who dance in wheelchairs. As a public school Teacher of many years, I made adaptive equipment for students with cerebral palsy. It seems that for much of my Life, I have been blessed to find connection with persons with disabilities. When Dr. Rupam Sarmah asked me to compose Music for his film, enacted by 80 real children and adults with "disabilities," I naturally jumped at the opportunity. Seeing in one of the scenes a "Don Bosco School," I once again marvelled at God's plan. I too attended a Don Bosco School in Port Chester, New York, where I grew up. This Music is inspired by and dedicated to those, who in disability, find great ability.



1M2 The Story of Young Den 2:18

Given the choice of using professional actors, Rupam instead chose 80 children and adults with disabilities. As you will see later in the libretto, many of these real-life actors became personal heroes and provided much Inspiration for the Music.



1M3 Don Bosco School 4:28

When I saw this frame in the film, I immediately called Rupam. I was surprised to see a "**Don Bosco**" sign at the Indian school yard! I grew up in Port Chester, New York, where we had our own *Don Bosco Center*. At Corpus Christi School, the Sisters and Priests were *Salesians*, an order founded by Don Bosco. Needless to say, I felt an instant affinity with the kids. In this scene, I first sketched the theme, "*Let Me Be Brave!*"



1M4 Unfortunate Scene of Bullying 0:32

An unfortunate scene of bullying. But Den has an uncrushable spirit and so does the person playing Den, *Mr. Sayomdeb Mukherjee*.



1M5 Raina's First Call 0:52

Raina, played by

1M16 Together We Stand! 3:17


This song was written for possible inclusion into the film. Though it didn't make the film, Rupam has expressed interest in including the work on a new production we'll be working on in the not-too-distant future.



STORMAficionados will recall that in 1990 and then resurrected in 2016, I composed a 2 hour musical prayer, SON of the STORM. In this new look at Mary Shelley's characters, William, the 11 year old son of Victor Frankenstein witnesses the birth of the Creature, a creation who ultimately becomes the "Messiah."

In 2018, Christopher Kulikowski created his own film version of the Shelly aftermath story and asked me to contribute a score with Krystoff Pendereki.

In this scene, "a Waltz for Father," the Creature plays an old keyboard. I tried to match the actor's speed and proximity to notes on the piano. This work comes from that inspiration conjoined with the Creature's loneliness and searching.
